Hospitality is something this church works on

steadily and with intention. We think about how to be welcoming in our worship services, so that people know what to expect and also how to participate authentically, without coercion or exclusion. Hospitality comes in the form of gluten free communion wafers, handicapped parking, greeters who run out into the rain with umbrellas to help people into the church, and of course choice coffee... Hospitality is important.

Hospitality isn't just about something nice we do for people. It feels like our way of understanding and reflecting the welcome of Jesus. And that means hospitality is never cookie-cutter. Never one size fits all. People are different and need different things.

Hospitality is a posture of seeing people in all their beautiful differences and practicing belonging, not just in music preferences, coffee flavors or bulletin fonts, but in the various quirks and struggles, needs and gifts each of us bears in our personhood.



I wondered recently how it is that hospitality, which we often think of as 'helping other people with their needs,' comes from the same root word as hospice and hospital, words about supreme vulnerability. Those are words that do not give off "guest towels and hostess gift" vibes. I just learned that the root word "hospes" in Latin means *both* host and guest. And that has cracked open the whole endeavor for me.

When we strive to welcome people to a church or to our home, we are at our best when we see ourselves in both of those roles. Of course we offer what we have: a table, food, friendliness, accommodations. But we also receive

what the person, whomever they are, brings with them, from a bottle of wine in a gift bag to a home-brewed set of life stories. We receive love and we give love, as that motto of ours goes.

Maybe this sounds kind of like pastor jargon. Here's where it becomes very real. When we had the opportunity to host the Fairfax Hypothermia Shelter this winter, our strength was in our effort to be both host and guest. We set out real plates and table cloths. We put real flowers in vases. But we also sat down and listened to stories. We received the gifts people brought with them.

They shared stories of exquisite courage and struggle. They offered to serve alongside us. They gave clear-eyed pleas for long-term systemic community engagement. And we received countless reminders of the power of church and the efficacy of our building. We received full-scale excuse removal in terms of what we can do to lighten the load of beloved children of God. We were blessed with joy and hope that linger long after our guests, aka visiting angels, departed.

Guest and host... For it to feel like true belonging, hospitality involves being both at the same time. And don't we learn that at the communion table all the time? Jesus Christ, the host, is at the same time the one broken for us. Jesus was always both host and guest. Guest and host... For there to be real welcome, real hospitality, we must be both.

From BPC's Session

The BPC Session identified these priorities for 2024 to guide all our ministry areas:

- To increase efforts to speak out and proclaim the good news in public witness, advocacy, justice work and community leadership.
- To increase connections between an affinity for church, community, and the depth of the Christian faith, particularly for our youth who love this church but then struggle to find another church later in life since it may not be exactly like BPC.
- To create a culture of belonging and fostering a more intentional welcome to LGBTQ+ individuals. To welcome those with disabilities and learning differences.
- To continue to streamline and restructure the number of programs and activities so that we live in a spirit of Sabbath, a "less is more," "work smarter" posture; to invite new leaders to step forward; to give permission to try things and let things go.
- To increase attendance, membership, and engagement with church ministries so that more people receive love. To let our on-line presence be an intuitive front door. To look forward rather than backwards and not to worry about the difference between COVID recovery and growth when it comes to numbers.
- To be a church in mission in ways that are hands-on, intergenerational, and that allow for face-to-face interaction with those who are suffering. To connect the dots explicitly between mission and faith. To be a place where people can discuss the hard topics facing our world.
- To foster authentic connections between people and God, particularly through small groups, retreats, classes, and generally having fun. To focus on "the other 6 days of the week."
- To maintain a high quality of worship that is relevant to people's lives, creative, and varied in style.
- To keep the momentum of sound and transparent financial practices, to care for the staff and facility and to honor commitment to mission partners.
- To maintain and promote youth & children's programs: IMPACT, Godly Play, Rainbow, Youth Connections, Snacks and Backpacks.

Hypothermia Recap

February 18 through 25, 2024

Since 2005, Fairfax County's Hypothermia Prevention Program has prevented death and serious injuries among our area's most vulnerable residents by ensuring that no one must sleep outside during the winter months. This program, which is available to any adult in need of immediate shelter, provides a warm place to stay, food, and other supportive services to help guests.

What an amazing week we had hosting the Hypothermia program at BPC, February 18 through 25. We were able to serve 40-52 guests each day! It was all made possible by over 130 volunteers from BPC, Living Savior Lutheran Church, Burke United Methodist Church and Halo Fitness Center who served 20 meals, provided hospitality and entertainment, offered mending, provided security, cleaned mats, and gave an amazing amount of donations of food, clothing, water and gift cards.

Some comments from our guests--"It's like a hotel!" and "Your people should open a restaurant!" and "Everyone is so warm and welcoming!"

Confirmation

Over Groundhog Day weekend many of our BPC confirmands plus two seasoned Presbyterian adults, Rev. Catherine Taylor and Jerry Reece, journeyed to Massanetta Springs Presbyterian Retreat Center in Harrisonburg, VA for a weekend together. We arrived Friday evening after a fun, beautiful ride down I-81 and feasted on a stunning sunset as



we reached the gorgeous Shenendoah Mountains. We stopped at Cook-Out in Harrisonburg for a happy dinner together just prior to our arrival at Massanetta.

The confirmation retreat was attended by 200 young people from the region. The lessons of the weekend included an overview of the Bible, a broad discussion of what it means to be Christian, what it means to be reformed, and what it means to be PC(USA). Small group activities included bonding exercises, designing an element of a worship service which was later executed on Sunday as an entirely youth-led worship service, and each confirmand working through a worksheet that asked questions aimed at helping students write their own statement of faith. Sprinkle in wacky energizers along with prayer and singing, outdoor games, allow for time with "home groups", add in tasty meals, and provide a decent quantity of personal self-directed time and it all made for a spiritually meaningful and fun weekend.

BPC Brings a series of Workshops to Help us understand, plan for, and support each other when Death, dying and Brief come to Call.

April 14th 10:15-11:00 (Sunday School Hour)

What is it like to watch someone whose life is ending? How can you be a support to that person, their family and yourself? What is helpful and what are the most common blunders to avoid.

<Part 1>: Christine Reimers, Hospice Chaplain, provides the basics of hospice, its philosophy, when it might be appropriate to consider, and how it might fit with one's sense of 'stewardship' of ALL of life.

April 21st 10:15-11:00 (Sunday School Hour)

<Part 2> The biology and realities of dying: Patricia Brockmeier, hospice nurse, will provide an overview of 'how we die' and when to initiate hospice care and how to talk openly with affected family members and friends about decisions, expectations and timing.

May 5th (Sunday School Hour)

Deryl Fleming and Becca Messman lead a workshop on the many facets of grief. Come to discuss and reflect on how to support others even in our own darkness. What is helpful and what isn't? What is good to say and pray and what isn't?

September 15th 10:15-11:00 Sunday School Hour

This workshop helps you prepare to talk about next steps and to be prepared. Come discuss how to talk to family about their wishes while you still can. Plan with broad strokes or nitty gritty. Talk about what questions to ask and whom to speak with as you help plan so that the wishes of yours or your loved ones are clear for those left behind.

October 20th: 12:30 Pot Luck Lunch

Bring your comfort food to share! This session focuses on how to fill in the empty spaces once a death has occurred. How do we plan and honor a lost loved one? How do we support each other in our immediate and ongoing grief? How do we fill in the gaps, or honor our sisters and brothers in special ways when it isn't crystal clear what they'd want.

November 3rd- All Souls Day Lunch -Soup for the Soul Lunch

When our mortality sets in: a session on wills and estate planning—how to access for the easiest to the most advanced care—planning for what's to be for what's left behind.

- We have extended an offer to Kyle Putnam as our interim youth director. This offer is in line with what we expected for the budget, we are thrilled to welcome Kyle to the BPC team.
- The facilities team presented their annual review of the maintenance needs of the church to the budget and finance team on March 14. We are grateful for Jocelyn Callister's leadership and savvy around supporting the needs of the church building and being a careful steward of our funds.
- We plan to send another principle only payment to Presbyterian Loan Foundation in March to pay down our mortgage.
- We have received 19% percent of the income we expected to receive year to date through the end of February.

As always, we are grateful for your continued generosity.


