

About Our Advent Theme "What do you fear?"

Luke's Gospel begins the story of Jesus with this opening line: "In the time of Herod..." This detail may seem minor to modern readers; however, it reveals layers of information about the fearful world Jesus entered, one filled with rampant oppression, economic disparity, uncertainty, and instability. A world not so unlike our own. And yet, throughout the stories of Christ's birth, we hear the whispers of angels delivering a surprising message: "Do not fear."

We've crafted an Advent series that takes seriously the angels' message and trusts that Christ's birth truly is good news of great joy for all people. The series looks closely at the fear and terror looming in the background during the time of King Herod and invites us to consider the fears we hold now. Fear can divide and paralyze us, and even be used as a tool for oppression. But what if we formed a different relationship with fear? Can we acknowledge fear without letting it rule us? Might we catalyze our fears into love and action? What if naming our fears helps us see more clearly how God is breaking in and where God is at work? This series gently invites us to identify where fear is present—both in the Advent story and in our lives—while also finding our way toward hope, with the angels' voices in our ears.

Every Advent, we light candles, sing carols, and pray for Christ's coming because we believe God entered a frightened world to bring good news. We hold onto hope because we believe that Christ did come—that's the promise of the season. Our hope is not flimsy or fleeting. It's gritty, resilient, and can endure—no matter what we fear or face. This season, let us insist on hope and trust that good news is greater than fear.

Fear is not always the enemy. Fear can be a helpful tool that makes us more alert to threat. A thump in the night in a quiet house can turn our whole mind into a big listening ear. Our heart pounds and we are ready to run or hide or fight. Until we realize it was just the wind knocking over a flowerpot. But, when fear becomes a strategy used by the news to garner our attention, when fear is sprayed out over us all the time, such that it clouds the air like tear gas, the result is not always alertness. The result might be confusion, rage, even paralysis.

This year, as I read over the Biblical texts that greet us during the season of Advent, I came to notice fear on the wind there, too. Fears of social rejection or relationship problems, simmer beneath the sweet Mary and Joseph story. Fears of imperial crackdowns set the tone for John the Baptist, out there, crying in the wilderness. Fears of the nervous King Herod kept the three Kings on their toes as they tried to find their way to the newborn king. Fear of the unknown, surrounded the shepherds in the midnight field. And when is childbirth not a beautiful but fearful time, even more so in days when there were no ultrasounds or C-sections. Advent is no stranger to fear. But this year, I am seeing courage, creativity, and compassion crowding it out. I am seeing hope, peace, and good tidings of great joy rushing in to bear witness to the wonders of God's love. Fear is still there but the gifts of God are stronger!

I don't know if this Advent feels more fearful or festive for you, but I hope you will journey with us spiritually this year toward the manger. There will be many ways to serve, share,

speak up, and keep silent together in our ministries. Maybe you serve at Community Meals, share a sweater, offer to be an Advent candle lighter, or join in singing the Messiah. Or maybe you invite someone to the Longest Night service as a light in their darkness.

May this Advent season remind you that fear does not get the final word. Love does. May courage rise, hope take root, and the light of Christ meet us all in the shadows, leading us home.



I am grateful for the gift of my sabbatical: your generous support, the time away from the regular routine, and those who capably led while I was away. My sabbatical time was full: family, friends, new places, beautiful scenery, delicious food, moving music, learning, good books, awe-inspiring moments and practical moments.

In late June-early July

My daughter, Elise, and I traveled to Vienna, Austria with the Vienna (VA) Choral Society. The trip was a musician's pilgrimage; there is so much music history in one place. We sang two concerts, accompanied by local instrumentalists, in the Minoritenkirche dating from the 1200s. I had a sense of timelessness singing in such an historic place with excellent acoustics. The voice of the soprano soloist soared over the voices of the choir singing, "Peace I leave with you...come all ye who are heavy laden." It was very moving.

We visited art museums, palaces, saw the Lipizzaner horses, and toured the city. The pastries and desserts were delicious; I decided wienerschnitzel isn't my favorite.



(The Queen of Spades) at the Vienna State Opera and a concert featuring The Four Seasons by Antonio Vivaldi. We took the streetcar to the Vienna Central Cemetery and visited the musician's section where Beethoven, Brahms, Schubert, Johann Strauss I and II, and Arnold Schoenberg are buried. There is also a monument to Mozart.

We drove to Eisenstadt, close to the Hungarian border, to tour the Esterházy Palace. Franz Joseph Hadyn was employed by the Esterházy family from 1761- 1790. My favorite excursion was to Melk Abbey along the Danube, west of Vienna.







The 1,000-year-old abbey sits atop a hill and was the original location of the capital (for the local ruling family) before it was moved to Vienna. There are apricot fields and an elaborate Rococo church on the grounds.

Also, my family vacationed in Costa Rica. Adam, Clara, and I spent two days in Montreat, NC picking up Drew and Elise from Youth Conference (we crashed keynote on Friday morning!). We met extended family on the South Carolina coast for a week at the beach.

Early August

I attended the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians Annual Conference in Raleigh/Durham. The main draw was three workshops with the renowned choral ensemble VOCES8. If you've never heard VOCES8 before, check them out on YouTube. They are AMAZING! I learned about their approach to music education, several tricks and tips, and attended an exquisite concert in the Duke Chapel. Another highlight of the conference was an evening hymn festival at the Holy Name of Jesus Cathedral (Raleigh). Tom Trenney (who composed *Speak*, *Lord*, the choral anthem commissioned by BPC in 2019) chose the selection of hymns/readings and led from the magnificent organ. The sanctuary was resonant and awe-inspiring. While I was just one person among hundreds singing the opening hymn, O God Our Help in Ages Past, I had a strong sense of, "even though I am only one, God cares about me."

August-September

After many weeks of travel, I was glad for time at home. I checked off a goal on my summer bucket list and hiked Old Rag Mountain. Once the kids returned to school, I reorganized,

cleaned out, painted, and gardened at home. I attended cross country meets, soccer games, music lessons, and start-of-school meetings. The kids and I visited museums on school holidays. I chaperoned a chorus field trip for Drew and Elise. I met friends and colleagues for coffee or lunch. I attended Sunday worship at the Old Presbyterian Meeting House, the National Cathedral, Clifton Presbyterian, and Foundry United Methodist.



Rainbow

What: Rainbow is the mid-week children's program at Burke Presbyterian Church for elementary-aged kids. Siblings in preschool are invited to tag along for our Raindrops program; older youth are welcome to come and assist in leadership. We sing, read Bible stories, play, and eat dinner together.

Who: Children in kindergarten through 6th grade (and their preschoolaged siblings!)

When: Wednesdays from 5:30-7:00 pm

Where: The Burke Presbyterian Church Gathering Space

Why: Rainbow offers breathing room in a busy school week. It nudges us to re-orient ourselves toward God's beloved community. It reminds us that

church happens all the time, not just on Sundays. Eating together helps us model the way Jesus used meals to welcome everyone. Rainbow fosters deep, sacred, lasting connections between families.

GODLY PLAY

Godly Play is an interpretation of Montessori Religious education, which means it is more like spiritual guidance than what is typically thought of in the church as Christian education.

At the heart of Godly Play is biblical storytelling, but Godly Play cannot simply be reduced to a clever and engaging way of telling stories. Rather, Godly Play is about creating a space for children that is for them — a place that honors their spiritual lives, a place to be a part of a circle and part of a spiritual community.

Godly Play is offered for children in grades kindergarten and older during both Sunday morning worship services following the children's message.

- Tie off the end of the stocking with a ribbon and bring it to church on December 7.

Advent 2025

Over the last few years, I have found myself growing in faith and pride in our BPC Community through travel. In 2023, I traveled with a small group to Kibwezi, Kenya--expecting a great experience and deepening faith--but not a transformative, life-changing experience. It was all of that. To see others with challenges so much greater than what most of us face is humbling. To see how their communities, facing great needs, have faith in God and how they support each other through a spirit of 'harambe' (all pull together), is powerful and heartwarming. To see how BPC has contributed over the last 40 years to supporting this community is amazing. This partnership with the church/school/Polytech/orphan care has transformed generations of people on both sides of the Atlantic.



When I first went 2 years ago, I had the chance to visit some micro-finance/table-banking groups. Walking with Africans is a small nonprofit started by a few members of Burke and Clifton Presbyterian churches--associated and somewhat supported by the church members--but not actually directly part of our partnership ministry. James Munthali, Ed Parker, Lyle Barlow, Dave Norman, and Mark Reimers have been actively supporting and advising groups in the Kibwezi area

of Kenya and in Malawi for a number of years. Getting to visit a group of women, working together and supporting each other in order to better support their families and communities fascinated me. Frankly, figuring out what table-banking was, and how it worked, and doing general math did not. Luckily, over time, and thanks to the research and experimentation done by the original group, now it is clear to me how the groups work and how and why it is succeeding in helping to raise these groups a little higher out of poverty.

Last year, I returned to Kenya and met with all the groups along with Greg Diggs, and heard their stories, challenges and successes. I am now on the board for Walking with Africans.



This fall, I visited the Walking with Africans (WAF) groups in Kenya and Malawi with James Munthali and Ed Parker. I can tell you, even on my third trip to Africa in 3 years, I was surprised at how eye opening and transformative it was for me and my faith. Seeing the progress of these groups in 1 year's time was such a joy and gave me that feeling where you can feel God breathing in you. To see these groups celebrating us when really *their* accomplishments are the celebration is humbling.

In Kibwezi, James, Ed and I were focused on the microfinancing. We ended up spending a fair amount of time on the Imani campus and seeing how the work of our partnership is supporting growth. It was a joy to see the staff and student body growing! Frankly, a piece of my heart resides in Kibwezi, Kenya. I feel a great deal of gratitude to the years of work and dedication of BPC, CPC, and the Kibwezi Parish!

Ed, James and I also visited Malawi. I was excited to meet the table banking groups in Malawi and to learn about the WAF groups there. I was most surprised by how different the culture and economics are in Malawi. I enjoyed seeing some Presbyterian landmarks and evidence of missionaries' work (and martyrdom) in its history. The biggest takeaway was the vast involvement of BPC

in Malawi missions. We visited with Beth Stuebing, who she preached at BPC last year and is a doctor residing in Malawi. She is currently recovering from a terrible car accident. It was meaningful to know BPC's connection and financial support help her to provide care. Then we visited a hospital that works to treat young people with HIV. We visited a school where BPC helped fund a girls' dormitory so that students can stay overnight and not be in danger going back and forth to school. How is it that I have been a member at BPC for over 10 years, served on Session and Deacons, and don't even know how far







and wide our support and influence goes! That pride in us as a church community and honor to get to learn about our impact on site is something that will stay with me.

Next summer there will be a service trip to Kibwezi. Consider getting involved – with the planning or the committee. **Look for information about the July 2026 trip and the application to apply on the next page.** Ask one of us Burke folks about Walking with Africans and how you can help. We are all in all of this together and are so much more when we support each other!



Mission trip to Kibwezi, Kenya, July 2026

A Group from BPC and Clifton Presbyterian Church will be traveling for approximately 2 weeks to Kibwezi, Kenya in July 2026. We have a 38 year relationship with The Bethel Church and PCEA Educational Center there and look forward to meeting old friends and making new ones while working beside them to achieve goals. Consider joining us!

The purpose of this mission and service trip is to grow spiritually as a small intentional group, as well as to strengthen relationships with our Kenyan partners.

We are looking for a group of 18-20 people who are ready for a Life Changing Experience. We invite youth at least 15 years old to apply. Our group will work and worship with our partners. Scaring Away the Hunger Monster: Teaching Our Preschoolers to Care for Others

At Burke Presbyterian Church, mission and ministry take many forms, from providing meals to neighbors through ECHO, to nurturing the spiritual and emotional growth of our youngest learners at Burke Presbyterian Church Preschool (BPCP). This fall, our preschoolers lived out that mission in a joyful, meaningful way as they joined forces with the congregation to help fight food insecurity in our community.



A Community Effort to "Stuff the Trunk"

Between October 15 and 24, preschool classrooms collected donations, and families were invited to join in a larger church-wide effort during Trunk or Treat. Together, our preschool, congregation, and neighbors worked to "Stuff the Trunk" with non-perishable food for ECHO (Ecumenical Community Helping Others), a long-time BPC mission partner dedicated to supporting families in crisis in the Burke and Springfield areas.

We are thrilled to share that the preschool and congregation together donated a whopping 804 pounds of food to ECHO! To help our preschoolers understand the magnitude of that gift, we told them that's about the weight of a fully grown grizzly bear!

This joyful project was more than just a food drive. It was an opportunity to model what it means to "love your neighbor as yourself." Through story, play, and hands-on action, our preschoolers learned that no one is too young to make a difference in God's world.

As one parent reflected, "The children showed us what empathy looks like in action. They understood that when we help others, we help make our community stronger — and that makes everyone feel full, not just in their tummies, but in their hearts."

We give thanks for our preschool staff, families, and the wider BPC community for showing our preschoolers that





service and compassion are part of who we are as the body of Christ. Together, we're helping to scare away the hunger monster — one can, one roar, and one act of kindness at a time.



Facilities

Connor Lygon's Eagle Scout project at BPC was identified by the BPC Facilities Team as one of the options for Connor to organize, plan, and coordinate Scout Troop approval. The supplies for the project were financed by the BPC Facilities Team with a contribution from the Scout Troop. The purpose of the project was to create an alternative emergency egress path from the BPC Meeting House exit doors, which are facing Chick-Fil-A, around the outside of the building to the front courtyard assembly location in

case of a building emergency. The normal evacuation route for the meeting house is out through the Gathering Space and the main front doors to the courtyard.

Connor coordinated the purchase and delivery of approx. 70 pavers for the project. The team of volunteers manually moved the pavers from the lower parking lot to the rear of the church and then laid the pavers out along the desired path near the meeting house windows and rear wall. The team also had to move "wood chips" from a large pile in the area for spreading round the pavers.

This is an "emergency only alternative egress path" but if it is ever used by church members it will be much easier to follow the path on the pavers than possibly dirt, mud or slippery icy conditions.
